Director of Faith Development's Messages - Children Love Luxury

"The children now love luxury. They have bad manners, contempt for authority, they show disrespect to their elders.... They no longer rise when elders enter the room. They contradict their parents, chatter before company, gobble up dainties at the table, cross their legs, and are tyrants over their teachers."



Director of Faith Development's Messages - Children Love Luxury (continued)



Whether we think this statement is harsh or accurate, it is stunning to know that this was said somewhere 'around' 427 – 347 BCE by either Plato, or Socrates, or Socrates quoted in Plato's Republic Book 4.

I hope this is a provocative segue into the question of why do we want to mix our ages? What is the sentiment and substance of the stated vision of Mixing Our Ages, as put forth in the UUCR Bridge to Tomorrow Long-Range Plan of 2009? I quote directly from this inspiring document:

"UUCR values community and connection of our members across the full spectrum of age, experience, and ability. We are proud to be a progressive-minded church that celebrates the spiritual curiosity of children, youth, and adults. Intergenerational activities that generate a feeling of inclusion and meaningful participation are important to our youth and adult members."

This vision is not only lofty, but it is lived. At UUCR, there are ample and cherished ways that the ages mix. Sometimes that is through teaching in Faith Development. Sometimes that is by worshiping side-by-side in the pews and singing together. Sometimes that is by walking through the streets of our neighbors' community for a cause. And sometimes that is when sipping apple juice or coffee and having small talk, that isn't so small. It happens and it is happening. And yet we still have to pay attention to the slippage towards separations that deprive all of us of sacred relationships that are fundamental to what it means to be human, across the ages.

A sad price is paid when we don't pay attention to the separations that our post-modern culture has imposed on us. Inadvertently, we have imposed this on ourselves. Even though technology promises us an instant sense of our interconnected lives and relationships, we can often feel isolated and alone, at any age. The abundance and speed of stimuli and devices can obscure our basic yearning to connect in person. We crave smiles of recognition and understanding, rapt eye contact, a comforting arm when there are no words. If we forego our opportunities to continue to build in intentional relationships across the ages, inevitably we may feel a discord. Because we are a diverse people and we come from different paths, we need to commit to putting ourselves in the way of hearing the call to be a mentor, an elder, a spiritual ancestor, a Wise One.

And let's face it, generational gaps can be scary. But they don't get any less scary if we keep our distance. Let us continue to experience what happens when we uncover and embrace the validity and vitality of each generation's viewpoint and learn to appreciate and empower

each other. Let's transform intergeneration tension to intergenerational collaboration. Let's learn together and most importantly, let's have fun!

Children DO love luxury, and don't we all? We love to luxuriate in moments and milestones that strengthen us and give us heartening stories to tell. By the way, Socrates was Plato's mentor. :)

ISRAELI AND PALESTINIAN YOUTH MUSICIANS OF HEARTBEAT EMBARK ON DEBUT US TOUR TO PROMOTE COOPERATION AND UNDERSTANDING

Heartbeat is the Israeli-Palestinian youth music community of young Arab and Jewish artists (ages 17-21) performing from Boston to Washington, DC for 15 shows at universities, music venues, and congregations. Based in Jerusalem, Heartbeat is an international non-profit organization uniting musicians, educators, and students to build mutual understanding and transform conflict through the power of music. Heartbeat creates opportunities and spaces for young Israeli and Palestinian musicians to work together, hear each other, and amplify their voices to influence the world around them. Heartbeat youth develop creative nonviolent tools to express themselves and become a voice for their communities.

This current tour program will feature uplifting performances interweaving traditional and modern Eastern and Western music and engage audience members through interactive workshops in which youth will share their experiences of growing up amidst the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. The Heartbeat message inspires people of all



backgrounds to work together to be the change we seek. All tour performances are free to the public and open to all ages. FINDING COMMUNITY AROUND THE CORNER: A RECAP OF THE INTERFAITH LEADERSHIP SUMMIT FOR HIGH SCHOOL YOUTH HELD AT THE UUCR



The leader of the Buddhist Meditation Group at my church describes practicing Buddhism as his way of finding the secret to life--the same secret that Muslims, Catholics, and Jews seek in their own faith traditions. Through my own spiritual exploration, I have realized that any self-proclaimed religious or spiritual being has found a unique and valuable secret to life.

It was not until I was a freshman in high school that I realized that my secret to life would stem from Unitarian Universalism, and not, in fact, the religion that I was born into. But I realized that by choosing to go out and find some secret, no matter how diverse our practices of exploring it may be, we all are ultimately chasing shared goals: social justice, empowerment, advocacy, and wholeness.

We all know that healthy relationships are driven by honesty and fidelity and are only possible when secrets are shared. The same is true for interfaith relationships between communities. What is service if these "life secrets" are kept? What is social justice without dialogue inspired by diverse ideas, beliefs, and ideologies? For my Girl Scout Gold Award Project I held an Interfaith Leadership Summit for high school youth to present their life secrets, spiritual investigation, and lived experiences. A summit that would, in turn, create a flow of ideas between the temples, mosques, and churches in my community.

Participants in this summit, held at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Reading, initiated dialogue, listened to speakers, and engaged in workshops designed to highlight the commonality in our diversity. They learned that you don't have to go miles, crossing town lines, or state borders, to find a community invested in the same principles as your own. That same community could exist within the church next door or the temple across the street. And all you have to do is walk in the door.
