Minister's Messages - April 18, 2013



My dear friends,

My heart has been breaking as I've continued to follow the tragic unfolding of the marathon bombing and its aftermath. I wish I could be with you tonight and join in this service of sadness and solidarity.

Please know that here in Iraq the news of Boston's tragedy has struck a deep chord with many people, and many Iraqis send their caring thoughts and loving prayers. Iraq is a land that knows too well the pain of shattered innocence that a bomb can bring. In talking about Boston's bombing with Iraqis today, *they spoke of the deep reserve of strength that Boston and her people will discover in the hours and days to come.* May be this be so.

My prayer for you is that you will hold your loved ones close, look into their eyes, speak gentle words, and treasure the blessings found in your relationships and friendships. I pray, too, that you will reach out with love to those you don't know but who may need to be reminded that people are good and kind. Be the face, hands, and voice of that kindness.

Lastly, I pray that you remember that there is a power stronger than any fear, greater than any destruction, and more enduring than any tragedy—and that power is known as Love. This is the power we invoke when we sing, "Spirit of life, come unto me, sing in my heart all the stirrings of compassion." Love is what binds up the broken. Love is what wipes away our tears.

My friends, may the spirit of life and love be with you as you remember the victims and their families and friends.

May the spirit of life and love be with all those working to restore peace and safety to our streets.

May the spirit of life and love hold our children when they are with us and when we send them out into the world.

May the spirit of life and love give you courage and hope in these days to come.

And may the longtime sun shine upon you, all love surround you, and the pure light within you guide your way on.

Blessed be. Amen.

Director of Faith Development's Messages - Meanwhile the Children Play....



It is unfathomable and shocking, once again, to be in the shadow of tragedy. Patriots Day 2013 and the traditional Boston Marathon is heavy with wounding in so many ways, and we are scared. We reach out to others, we pray, we work, we distract. Meanwhile, the children cuddle and then run off and play. While so much feels wrong right now, our daily routines for work, school, play, meals, and rest are the ways to provide the healthy framework and comfort that our

children need.

Meanwhile the children play, and watch us. For some of us, we are mustering all the wisdom and courage we can to answer questions or more likely, to try to make our children feel safe while we say, "I don't know." We can ask them, "what do you want to know?" May we be clear and honest, now....weeks and months from now. No matter what we choose to say or not say, let us be reminded that as parents, elders, mentors, and role models in our children's lives, we show them the depth of our caring. We continue with normalcy, somehow. This is what our wise experts share with us, every time. Children have powerful instincts to express themselves, to protect themselves, and to get a little closer to us for a little while.

We hold in our hearts all the families, friends, children, adults who are suffering. These people are us, and we are them. Children fear that the event might happen again, that someone close to them will be hurt or will die, or that they will be left alone or separated from their family. We fear this too. May we be allowed to slow down and nurture ourselves and our families. May each of us light a candle for our neighbors and visitors who have been affected by this terrible happening.

It is important to keep in mind that each family is processing this with their children in their own way. That means that some parents are intentionally deciding not to share any details about yesterday's incident with their children. Let us muster the courage and calm to be with our children in the way that they need us, knowing all the while that we will need time to steal ourselves a bit of solitude to come undone.

Meanwhile, in places at home, near and far, adults and some children gather for vigils, candle lightings, hugs and prayers. During one such vigil here are [UUUCR](#) the children gathered in the space next door. While adults deepened into powerful silence and tears, laughter may have been heard. Many adults – professional caregivers and lifetime caregivers – joined a circle of children of all ages. Together they made colorful name tags, decorated cookies, and then returned to a circle for fun. Silly games became epic as each person, of various sizes and ages, embraced the opportunity to work together towards a single goal, a shared victory. They played big, laughed hard, and settled in deeply to talking games that required everyone's questions, thoughtfulness, and support. No small metaphors for the ways we can give our children age-appropriate, specific ways to help them know that they can help restore family and community.

Meanwhile, may we seek out comforting connections in all our circles of family, friends, and community.....as we let the children play.

WORDS OF SUPPORT FROM TRANSYLVANIA REGARDING MARATHON BOMBING

From Rev. Ferenc Balint Benczedi, Bishop of the Unitarian churches in Transylvania (Romania), where our partner congregation is located:

"We were shocked and saddened to learn about the bombs at the Boston Marathon. It is unthinkable that sound people would consider and prepare in cold blood the killing of their fellow beings. It is unthinkable, yet it happened, maiming and killing not just those present but in a way hurting all of us: it shattered once again our sense of safety and freedom, our ideals about human beings and our life.

"Please know that our prayers are with all of you and especially with the families of the victims and the wounded on their hospital bed. We pray for all of you to bear this tragedy with fortitude and be present with your love and compassion for those in need.

"At times like these it is very hard for the word of reason to be heard, yet our Unitarian and Universalist legacy compels us to do so. We are reminded of Kipling's poem 'If': 'If you can wait and not be tired by waiting; Or, being lied about, don't deal in lies; Or, being hated, don't give way to hating...'

"We believe that those values for which we stand, cannot be wiped away by bombs, we cannot be frightened into silence and we will not give way to hating.

"We wish you courage and determination for the days to come in being the voice of reason, love and compassion in the congregations and in your society.

"May God's blessing be with us to give us strength to uphold our values and live by them!"

UUCR VOLUNTEERS COOK FOR BREAD AND ROSES AND LOOK TO THE FUTURE



Who are these masked and aproned folks, and what are they doing?

They're UUCR members and friends, cooking a meal in the church kitchen for guests at the Bread and Roses soup kitchen in Lawrence. Walt Tuvell, Christine Thomas, Jamie Maughan, Don Pearson, Ann Fisher, Nancy Bond, and Linda King gathered on April 5 to turn many shopping bags of bread, chicken, pasta, peas, bacon, milk, butter, and cream cheese into a hearty, filling pasta primavera and at least a dozen loaves of garlic bread. Christine Thomas and Anne Mark took the food to Lawrence on April 6 for the evening meal.

Bread and Roses volunteers cook and serve dinner for 100-125 guests 5 nights a week. Several UUCR congregants have volunteered as servers over the past year and now dream that they and other UUCR volunteers can prepare and deliver a meal the first Saturday of each month. The group has submitted an application to UUCR Helping Hands to buy groceries for providing one meal a month for the coming year.

The group of masked cooks gained a feeling of great satisfaction from preparing the meal. "But," as Jamie Maughan reports, "there was also entertainment value involved as we enjoyed the social bonding during cooking and our improvised après-cooking celebration. It was so much fun we look forward to sharing it with others one Saturday a month in the future."
