Our Mission

Together we search for spiritual truth and meaning as we celebrate life within a dynamic, caring community. We live our principles through worship, social outreach, lifelong learning and shared ministry, creating a better world for ourselves and future generations. We welcome all to join us.

Leadership at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Reading

Our Unitarian Universalist congregation is a self-governing entity. The congregation controls its own finances and property, and selects its leadership and form of governance. Our minister is called to partner with us by a vote of the congregation.

Semi-annual meetings are held in the fall and spring, at which time voting members of the congregation gather to elect Governing Board members and other officers, to hear reports of ministry groups, approve the budget and act on any special issues. Additional meetings may be held at the recommendation of the Governing Board to address concerns as they arise.

In short, the leadership of the congregation originates from the members themselves, and is carried out in collaboration with our professional staff and committed lay leadership. In order to facilitate informed and skilled leadership within our congregation, leadership development opportunities are offered regularly during the year.

Governing Board

Our Governing Board consists of the President, Vice President for Programs, Vice President for Finance, Vice President for Planning, and five at-large members.

The work of the Governing Board is to set policy and to support the work of the staff and committees of the church. They have fiduciary responsibility for the congregation. Part of their job is to ensure the congregation is living out its mission. They listen to the congregation, understand how our church is being called to act in the world, and then provide leadership to get us there. The Board also creates an operating budget for the church for presentation at our Annual Meeting each spring, which the church members approve. All Governing Board members attend a daylong retreat at the start of the church year to set the year's goals and then meet once a month. Minister: Rev. Tim Kutzmark

Rev. Tim has been a minister for over eleven years, serving a vibrant congregation in Richmond, Virginia and working as a chaplain at Hasbro Children's Hospital in Providence, Rhode Island, before being called by the congregation to be the 31st minister of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Reading. Tim is a graduate of Harvard Divinity School, a former staff member at Harvard Business School, a skilled meditation instructor and certified teacher of Yoga, and a former professional magician. Church Administrator: Rosemary Fiori

Rosemary has managed the administrative affairs of the church for over five years with care, skill, and a dedication to service. An accomplished professional prior to coming to the church, she previously served as the Supervisor of a local YMCA. First and foremost is Rosemary's dedication to children, youth, and adolescent causes. Rosemary has been a New York City Fresh Air Fund host for over 15 years and a youth facilitator for lesbian/gay/bisexual/transgendered teens in New Hampshire for years. For her own teens-in-residence, she spends countless hours in attendance at jazz concerts, youth symphonies, gallery showings, and impromptu jams as audience, chaperone, cheerleader and critic. A fun-feminist (not an oxymoron) and a supporter of liberal causes and social justice, she has a long affiliation with the National Organization for Women.

Administrative Operations

Under the guidance of the Governing Board, several lay-led teams support the operational responsibilities of the congregation. The Finance Council, working with the Treasurer and Bookkeeper, facilitates the creation and periodic review of the budget. The Personnel Committee ensures a positive relationship with our staff. Our Nominating Team invites people to serve on the Governing Board. Finally, various task forces are created as needed when the Governing Board identifies a particular need. Rosemary Fiori, our Office Administrator, is the staff person who oversees much of the day-to-day administration of the church.

Adult Enrichment and Spiritual Programs

Central to Unitarian Universalism is a life-long exploration of religious truth, meaning and experience. UUCR is a community committed to this continuous journey. The Adult Enrichment Team plans and organizes programs that encourage personal and spiritual growth and lifelong learning. We offer many different classes, workshops and retreats. Our minister leads several programs a year. Our Intern Minister may teach some courses; skilled members of the congregation facilitate other programs. Programming includes meditation classes, workshops on spiritual growth and personal development, classes about world religions, Unitarian Universalist identity, parenting, and daylong spiritual retreats. Two or three times a year we organize "Dinners from Five to Nine". Usually these are just for adults, although sometimes families with children participate as well. Guests meet at the home of a sponsoring family. Each guest brings something for the meal: a salad, dessert, or side dish. It's an evening of spontaneous fun and a wonderful opportunity to get to know other people in the church.

Faith Development and Programming for Children and Youth

Faith Development offers programs that, from children's earliest years through high school, engage our young people in the exploration of faith, spirituality and meaningful relationships. Our curriculum unfolds in an environment of celebration and inquiry that encourages young people to explore our Unitarian Universalist values and shape their Unitarian Universalist beliefs.

On Sunday morning, our 9:15 AM service offers full children's faith development and exploration classes. Nursery care and play school are available for the youngest members in our community, staffed by professional child care providers.

For kids K-6, classes are taught by trained volunteers, and are grouped by age. These classes are full of activities, stories, and experiences that explore spirituality, religion, and Unitarian Universalist values. Our seventh graders have a special program (Neighboring Faiths) where they spend some time on campus and other time visiting area churches, mosques and other places of spirituality or worship in order to learn what other religious traditions believe and practice. The Coming of Age years begin in 8th grade with sequenced programs that explore the sources of Unitarian Universalist values and spirituality, personal identity and peer relationships, and a culminating rite of passage year. Teens participate in the Senior High Young Program which meets most Sunday evenings from 6:30-8:30 P.M. for sharing, worship, spiritual exploration, and social justice initiatives. Green Sanctuary Team

The Green Sanctuary Team works to support the full expression of the Unitarian Universalist's Seventh Principle: to "affirm and promote respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part." Current efforts are focused on advancing the church's candidacy to become a certified "Green Sanctuary," which means we have addressed sustainability issues on a congregational as well as personal level. With wide congregational support, our team works to develop and implement programs across a range of areas, including justice and sustainable living. Ongoing activities and one-time events support environmental awareness at the level of the individual, the church community, and the larger community.

Helping Hands

The Helping Hands Outreach Program is a unique and important part of our church community, allowing us to reach out beyond our walls and put our faith into action. A generous donor has contributed \$10,000 yearly to establish an outreach fund for the Unitarian Universalist Church of Reading. The overall intent of the project is to educate the entire church community about the work of local non-profits that are in alignment with Unitarian Universalist values, to enter into a one year working partnership with a selected local non-profit, and to have multi-generational opportunities for service and meaningful experiences. The way we do this is special, and created in a way to engage our children into the larger life of the church

community. In the words of the donor: the goal of this fund is "to help children and adults learn the value of giving and to gain a first hand experience in understanding and promoting UU principles locally." This year, our new Helping Hands partner is The Food Project, an amazing nonprofit that focuses on a three-part mission: Youth, Food and Community. Youth: The Food Project has built a national model of engaging young people in personal and social change through sustainable agriculture. Our own Coming of Age members will get first-hand experience in this. Food: Food from The Food Project's 37 acres in Massachusetts is distributed through Community Supported Agriculture aimed at providing fresh produce to those that might not otherwise be able to afford it. Community: The Food Project also helps others in the community grow their own food through community programs and training resources. We welcome anyone interested in gardening, hunger/justice, or "youth, food and community" issues, to join in planning, coordinating, or assisting with the upcoming projects. Program Council

The Program Council is made up of representatives from each of the church ministry teams or committees. They meet every other month to discuss and plan program priorities for the congregation, and for leadership development training. The Program Council helps coordinate the day-to-day programs of the church, including the scheduling of events and facilitating collaboration among the various ministry teams and committees. They also work with the Governing Board to implement the goals of the congregation.

Support to our Members and Friends

Caring and Sharing Team

Caring and Sharing is a group of volunteers who are willing to assist church members and friends with rides, meals, and other practical support during times of illness or other critical need. Pastoral Care Team

We have a trained group of volunteers who offer pastoral support to those facing challenges in their lives. These volunteers work closely with our Minister, and are an extension of our Minister's pastoral care. These individuals are trained in listening skills, confidentiality, and boundary setting within the context of pastoral care. The Pastoral Care Team provides a supportive presence during crisis or transition. The team brings a variety of life experiences, interests and skills to their ministry.

Social Action and Social Justice

We believe that working for Social Justice is an expression of our Unitarian Universalist faith in action. We address many different social justice issues at a local, regional and global level. Come and inspire us! If there is a social justice or social action issue you feel strongly about, this is the place where you can get the support and encouragement to put your passion into action.

Here are some of the things we do:

Direct Action:

Join us for hands-on involvement in social action projects such as Habitat for Humanity, Jericho Road Project (working with non-profit agencies in nearby Lawrence), Walk for Hunger, Reading Food Pantry, serving dinner at a homeless shelter, The Louis D. Brown Peace Institute in Dorchester, the Food Project, or a beach clean-up day. The UU Urban Ministry invites participation in the Roxbury Youth Programs—an after-school program focused on helping youth develop the academic, interpersonal and leadership skills that will

empower them to be leaders in their families, schools and communities.

Educational Forums:

Join us for after church or weeknight educational programs on important issues. Past forums included Ethical Eating, Environmentally Sustainable Living, Economic Justice, Hunger and Distribution of Food, Racism, Classism, Ipswich River Preservation, Protection of Whales and other Sea Mammals, Water Rights, Middle East Peace, Individuals and Families with Developmental Disabilities, and Homelessness.

Advocacy and Witness:

We get directly involved in issues such as Marriage Equality, Economic Justice, and Environmental Sustainability. Join us for everything from postcard writing campaigns to visiting our elected officials, from marching in the streets to standing in protest on a picket line. Through UUMASS Action, our denomination's statewide lobbying and advocacy organization, we can make sure our progressive religious voice in heard on Beacon Hill.

Through our church members' generosity, we have provided financial support for organizations doing important work such as Catalyst Foundation (working with orphaned youth in Vietnam), UU Urban Ministry (working with inner city youth), Mission of Deeds (a local organization providing household items to previously homeless families and individuals), Precious Cause (a fund to raise money for SOS Children's Village for AIDS orphans in Botswana, Africa), Foundation for International Community Assistance Village Banking (helping woman in Haiti finance small businesses), KIDS IN AMAZON (school supplies for kids in the rain forest, and Skate Afghanistan (a youth outreach program in Afghanistan).

Sunday Morning Services

At the Unitarian Universalist Church of Reading, we gather as a spiritual community on Sunday mornings. We offer two services. The first service begins at 9:15, and the second service at 11:00. Our Sunday worship services are diverse in theme and style. There is congregational and choral singing and instrumental music as well. There are inspiring, thought-provoking sermons and readings, prayer and meditation. We often share meaningful rituals. You can light a candle to mark important milestones or moments in your life. The participation of children and young adults is an important part of our Sunday worship as well.

Both services supply meaningful and enriching worship, but there are differences between the two services. *Our children's classes for grades K-7 are offered at the 9:15 AM only*, so families with kids tend to come to the earlier service. All children and youth from preschool through 6th grade are present in the sanctuary with their families for the first part of worship service. Before the sermon begins, the young people leave to attend their faith development classes where they worship and learn in an atmosphere filled with wonder and creative activities.

Both services usually have similar themes and sermons with different musical offerings. The earlier service tends to be infused with more energy, and the later service is often more meditative. Occasionally each service will be different. For those occurrences, we advertise weeks ahead the special nature of each service.
